Weekend of July 15-16 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

We are a community that welcomes all people as brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ. Together we are the body of Christ, living and active today.



Sunday, July 16th Rom 8:18-23

Paul, today, assures us that even though we suffer now, a future of well-being and freedom from suffering await us. In God's love we will be set free. Scripture has always held that we have suffering because of the sin of Adam and Eve. They freely chose to divorce themselves from God's love. As a result, God pronounced a curse on the earth itself. In Genesis, we read, "Cursed be the ground because of you! In toil you shall eat its yield all the days of your life" (Gen 3:17). Now, Paul declares that through Jesus, not only will humans be set free, but even this very earth will become the place of peace and blessing it was always meant to be. God's love is more powerful than human sin!

Monday, July 17th Ex 1:8-14, 22

After the death of Joseph, a new Pharoah comes to power in Egypt, one who never knew Joseph and all the good he did for Egypt. He sees that there are quite a few of these foreigners present in the land. Because he does not trust their loyalty, he orders them to be enslaved, so they will not have the freedom or ability to revolt against Egypt. He further orders all male children born to the Hebrews to be killed upon birth. Even though in truth, the Hebrews have been a source of blessing and life through Joseph, the Pharoah fails to see them as such. Instead, Pharoah's blindness leads to separation, fear, and hatred. This is very similar to what Joseph's brothers felt toward him. The past seems to have returned to bite the people.

Tuesday, July 18th Ex 2:1-15a

Today we hear of the birth of Moses. He escapes his death sentence because of a loving mother and a compassionate daughter of Pharoah. Notice that the name Moses means "Drawn out of the water." We have here, perhaps an early reference to Baptism. It is by being drawn out of the waters of Baptism that we are saved.

Wednesday, July 19th Ex 3:1-6, 9-12

Today, we read about God calling Moses. The story pictures a loving, compassionate God who sees the suffering of his people and seeks to rescue them from their situation. It seems God's response to suffering is always the same. He seeks release and healing for his people. Moses, like ourselves, will be the instrument through whom God's saving grace comes to his people.

Thursday, July 20th Ex 3:13-20

Yesterday's theme of God's love and mercy in the face of our suffering continues today. God tells Moses, "I am concerned about you and about the way you are being treated in Egypt; so I have decided to lead you up out of the misery of Egypt into ... a land flowing with milk and honey." God, in his mercy always wants his people to thrive in happiness!





Friday, July 21st Ex 11:10—12:14

Today we have the story of the roots of one of the highest of the Jewish holidays, Passover. This feast is centered around God choosing the poor and enslaved Hebrews over the rich and well Egyptians who were keeping them in slavery. This being chosen by God was a chief part of Israel's self-identity. For us Christians, the church has always taught that the death and resurrection of Jesus was a second Passover. A time when God called forth his new people and gave them victory over slavery to sin and death!

Saturday, July 22nd Sgs 3:1-4b

Today is the Feast of St Mary Magdalene, so our narrative from Exodus is interrupted by a reading from the Book of Songs. The Book of Songs is a collection of love poems. In today's poem, a bride seeks out the one she loves. She cannot bear being separated from him. After searching for him among the people, she finds him again. Mary Magdalene was a friend of Jesus who sought him out after his death. She is a model for us. Is finding Christ and loving him the highest goal of our life, or is there something else that we put first. Let us pray that our love for Jesus may be always true in our hearts!

Dear Padre,

I have a friend who has been coming to church with me, and he often has questions I can't answer. The big one last week was, "Why don't Catholics have more Bible preaching instead of all this ceremony?" I try to explain, but I don't think I have the right words. Help!

Your friend's question is very common because our Catholic ceremony can be confusing to those of other faiths.

The Catholic Mass comes from two prayer traditions. First, there is the tradition of the Jewish synagogue service where people gather to read and study the word of God. Second, there is



the tradition of the early Christians who met in their homes to celebrate the breaking of the bread.

The earliest Christians, Jewish converts, maintained their Sabbath tradition of reading and studying the word of God. They added to that the gift of the Eucharist that Jesus gave them. Our Mass puts these two together in the Liturgy of the Word (readings, preaching, prayers) and the Liturgy of the Eucharist (offering, eucharistic prayer, holy Communion).

The homily may not be as long as it is in some other Christian traditions, but the preaching should be solid, based on Scripture, and in line with the teaching of the Church. We are a Church of word and sacrament. We listen to the word of God and we celebrate the breaking of the bread.
