Our Lady of the Desert

Sunday, July 23rd Rom 8:26-27

In today's second reading from Romans, Paul speaks about prayer. Paul understands that we humans are not perfect, and so we sometimes are confused about how to pray. However, Paul points out that the Holy Spirit dwells in us. The Spirit will take up our imperfect prayers and perfect them in God's hearing. Prayer itself becomes a work between us and the Spirit. The Spirit helps us to always present pleasing prayer before God.

Monday, July 24th Ex 14:5-18

Today we have the story of the crossing of the Red Sea. The Egyptians have changed their minds about letting the Hebrews go. The army pursues them to the sea. When the people cry out to God, he comes to their help. He has Moses divide the water so that dry land appears in the midst of the sea. The people cross over. As the Egyptians start to follow them, the waters flow back and destroy the army of Pharoah. This is a story of deliverance but also a story which shows that God will always be with us and help us in the hard times of life!

Tuesday, July 25th 2 Cor 4:7-15

As today is a feast day, we have readings which interrupt the story of the Exodus. Paul poetically speaks today of our life in Christ. He states the obvious: Jesus's grace is inside of us weak, imperfect humans. However, the power of Jesus always shines through in our lives, even in our weakest moments. God continually works to bring us to life in Christ. He moves us to grow and overcome our weaknesses. His grace is always stronger than our weaknesses.

Wednesday, July 26th Ex 16:1-5, 9-15

The people, now out of Egypt, are traveling through the desert. Already, they forget all the love and care God has showed them. Their hunger blinds them to God's presence. In response to their grumbling, God sends them quail in the evening and manna in the morning. God's love for his people continues, even when we might think that because of their sinfulness, they do not deserve his love. But, God's love and mercy for his people are always stronger than our weaknesses and sin.

Thursday, July 27th Ex 19:1-2, 9-11, 16-20b

The Hebrew people have been led out of Egypt to God. He meets them today at Mount Sinai. He appears to them in symbols of his strength. He appears as a dark cloud, and as a storm, and as fire on the mountain, and his speaking with Moses is heard as thunder. The great and almighty one has come down to his people. Even in their frail humanity, God loves them and gives himself to them.

Friday, July 28th Ex 20:1-17

Today, God gives the ten commandments. It is important to see why the commandments are given. God tells Moses that it was because of his great love for them, that God chose them to be his people, and freed them from Egyptian slavery. The 10 commandments are seen as a way of showing our thankfulness to God for what he has done for us. They are also a show of our love towards the God who loves us so much. We should always seek to thank God by refraining from thoughts and actions that are against who he is. Following the commandments is about love and wanting to please the God who has done so much for us!

Saturday, July 29th Ex 24:3-8

The people agree to follow God's will. Moses then initiates a covenant ceremony wherein the people enter a covenant with God. This covenant makes God and his people a "family." The people are splashed with the blood of the sacrificed animals to symbolize their involvement in this covenant agreement. They will also eat the flesh of the sacrificed animals as a further expression of this fact. This covenant reminds us of the mass where we celebrate a new covenant in the blood of Christ through which we are redeemed and made God's holy people. There too we eat the flesh and drink the blood of the sacrificial victim, under the forms of bread and wine.


Bible Study






How does the Eucharistic Prayer unite us to Jesus and bring us into his eternal prayer of praise to the Father in the Holy Spirit?







Act of Spiritual Communion



Dear Padre,

Christians teach that Adam and Eve were the first man and woman and that they were created by God. How does the Catholic Church reconcile this belief with the theory of evolution?

Chapter 1 of Genesis contains the seven-day account of creation that we usually refer to when we reflect on the beginning of our world. The very next chapter contains a second account. The editors of the Bible were not distraught over the two differing



accounts; they left them side by side because they weren't interested in giving either a historical or scientific explanation for the world's origin. Rather, they were emphasizing deeper truths, such as the goodness of the earth as created by a loving and caring God. Scripture tells us that the Creator held human beings as especially precious.

Cannot these same values be maintained if we believe creation (or evolution) took longer than seven twenty-fourhour days? Perhaps God actually spent seventy billion years bringing forth the world's beauty. Details and numbers don't change the message of Genesis: God is good; God created the cosmos, heaven and earth, "all things visible and invisible," as we profess in the Nicene Creed, and all of creation is good. Furthermore, scientific discoveries surrounding space, matter, and all forms of life "invite us to even greater admiration for the greatness of the Creator, prompting us to give him thanks for all his works and for the understanding and wisdom he gives to scholars and researchers" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 283).
