Welcome: The Redemptorist Community and Pastoral Staff of the Redemptorist Renewal Center extends a warm and loving welcome to all who come here to pray and worship in our church. We are a community that welcomes all people as brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ. Together we are the body of Christ, living and active today.



September 24th Phil 1:20c-24, 27a Paul, in today's Second Reading, states that he seeks to honor Christ both in life and in death. While he would love to enter into Christ's loving presence in heaven, yet he is also very happy to remain alive and working for the Church. Paul's own will is not first with him. He wills whatever God wills for him. He is content either way. Such detachment from our own will should mark our lives as well. There is a peace to be found in forgetting our will and living only for God.

September 25th Ezr 1:1-6 Today's reading gives an account of something that God's people have been waiting for. The people from Judah, in the south, are being sent back to Jerusalem by their conqueror. King Cyrus of the Persians says that God has called him to release the Jews. Even through their sin and exile, God has not forgotten His people. He reaches out to them with the possibility of a new beginning. God calls His people back home!

September 26th Ezr 6:7-8, 12b, 14-20 A new king comes to rein in Persia. He too encourages the rebuilding of Jerusalem and God's temple. Money is sent down to help with this rebuilding program. Of course, there is also to be a second type of rebuilding. Not only should the people rebuild Jerusalem, but they must also rebuild themselves into the true dwelling place of God. The prophets Haggai and Zechariah work with the people in this process. A bright future is in store for the people if they truly turn from sin and rebuild their faith.

September 27th Ezr 9:5-9 Ezra has been writing about the rebuilding of Jerusalem. Today, he enters into prayer. He admits that the people had sinned and turned away from God. Because of this, they were punished with exile. Now, he thanks God for his mercy in allowing the exiles to return home. He also acknowledges that the newfound good will of the Kings of Persia towards the people was also the work of God. God never tires of giving His people another chance. His mercy endures always!

September 28th Hg 1:1-8 The prophet Haggai writes to the people who have returned from exile. Unfortunately, their top priority has been to rebuild their own houses, not the temple. God encourages them to turn now to what should have been priority number one for them, the temple of their God. God points out that until he can find pleasure in the people because they are seeking to do his will, their endeavors in life will not be successful. God needs to be put in first place to truly find happiness in life.

September 29th Dn 7:9-10, 13-14 Today, we celebrate the Arch Angels. The reading from The Book of Daniel centers in on the heavenly worship of the angels. Into the midst of this worship comes the Son of Man (Jesus). He is given full power and honor by God. His reign will last forever. He, the eternal King, will lead his people home to the Father.

September 30th Zec 2:5-9, 14-15a Todays reading from the Book of the Prophet Zechariah speaks of the fact that God himself is the true protecting wall of his people. His glory will be their glory. Zechariah speaks of God coming to dwell among his people. His home will be with them, not away from them. Because of his presence, many countries will come to Jerusalem and make their home there. Christians hold that this prophesy is fulfilled in the Church.





Ignatian Silent Retreat Praying and Living in the Ignatian Way

October 13-15, 2023

Ignatian Spirituality involves not just our prayer and explicitly spiritual practices, but also affects the way we live our daily lives in relationship with God, other people, ourselves, and our world.

Moreover, our prayers in the Ignatian way are not monolithic, but are a personal combination of various "spiritual exercises," including biblical meditation, imaginative contemplation, the regular examination of our consciousness, participation in the Eucharist and other Sacraments, spiritual reading, personal devotions, and other prayerful practices.

Similarly, living in an Ignatian way does not mean becoming just like St. Ignatius of Loyola, but rather striving to live as God desires for each one of us personally, expressing the virtues modeled for us by our Lord, Jesus Christ, and fostered in us by the Holy Spirit.

Thus, Ignatian Prayer and Living are intimately connected and form a coherent whole, with prayerful discernment of what God has given us and asks of us.

This retreat provides an opportunity to reflect on our own lives and what adjustments we might want to make in our spiritual practices and our interpersonal relationships. It will include presentations, daily Mass, and plenty of time for silent prayer, along with opportunities for Confession and optional small group sharing.



Fr. Felix Just, SJ, is a member of the "Jesuits West USA Province" of the Society of Jesus and a much sought-after retreat leader. He is currently serving the Archdiocese of Los Angeles as Coordinator of Theological and Liturgical Formation in the Office of Diaconate Formation and as Coordinator of Ongoing Formation for Priests in the Office of the Vicar for Clergy.

Fr. Felix entered the Jesuit Novitiate in 1980 and was ordained a priest in 1991. After receiving his Ph.D. in New Testament Studies from Yale University, he has taught theology and biblical studies at several universities, led many retreats and pilgrmages, and offered many public

presentations and courses. He has also taught in the Catholic Bible Institutes of several arch/dioceses. He is a member of the editorial board for the revision of the New Testament of the New American Bible and is an active member of the Catholic Biblical Association of America. Fr. 

Dear Padre,

When can I take photographs in church? During my niece's baptism. I was told to put my camera away. We have a confirmation and a wedding coming up, and I don't want to get in trouble again.

Reverence and courtesy are the issues here. Reverence keeps in mind that what is real about baptism and all the sacraments does not come out in photos. Courtesy notes that other folks are trying to enter into the awe and joy of the mystery, and people taking photographs can get in the way or distract.

Parishes differ in rules and regulations. Many parishes prohibit



the taking of pictures. Certainly taking flash pictures is annoying in a way that taking available-light photos is not. But even with nonflash pictures, the photographer is trying to get around people and into a good spot.

Weddings call for photos from approved photographers. In most United States cultures, photos at funeral Masses are out of place. However, there are exceptions, such as the situation of an infirm woman who was unable to attend her sister's funeral. She was extremely upset until her niece thought to record it with her phone. The pastor had no problem with this solution.

No matter what the situation, it is always best to check with the parish office before the event. If it is permitted, get a few good pictures and then be sure to close your eyes in prayer so you can see what is really going on.
