Our Lady of the Desert

December 17th 1 THES 5:16-24

Paul calls us to a spirit of thankfulness today. When we are thankful, we are paying attention to all the blessings God sends us each day. When we are not practicing thankfulness, are minds are often closed to God's presence. If we keep our minds on the wonderful things that we have, we will find so much more inner peace. Peace is destroyed by wanting what we do not have. We cannot be at peace if we think we deserve more. So, thankfulness is a virtue that will keep us humble and at peace.

December 18th Jer 23:5-8

Jeremiah prophesies to a defeated people. Their enemies have beaten them and most of the wealthy and politically powerful have been taken away into exile. Jeremiah assures them that one day one of David's sons will again sit on the throne. This harkens back to the "good old days" when a faithful king brought peace and prosperity to the land. Jeremiah also prophesies that God will lead his people back home from exile, just like he rescued them from Egypt. Jeremiah offers hope to a desperate people.

December 19th Jgs 13:2-7, 24-25a

The Book of Judges takes up the story of Samson today. As we see so often, his parents have been unable to have a child. Now, God enters the situation to bring about a son. Many famous and significant people share this kind of history within the scriptures. Perhaps this is a reflection on how the grown-up child becomes strong and influential. They do it not by their own human abilities, but through the grace and blessings of God. God is always working to bring salvation to His people.

December 20th Is 7:10-14

King Ahaz is an unfaithful king. Isaiah tries to get him to listen to the word of God by offering a sign. Ahaz is not interested, because he would rather have things go according to his own will, not the way God wants things to go. Yet, Isaiah says that he will receive a sign anyway. A virgin will conceive and bear a son. When Ahaz sees this happen, he will know that God has spoken and he will have to choose between his will and God's. Of course, the Church looks further ahead to another virgin who bears a son! Nothing is impossible for God.

December 21st Sg 2:8-14

The Books of Songs is a book of love poems. The church has always interpreted these poems as speaking of the love relationship between God and His people. Today we hear someone crying out in joy, because her lover has come and called to her. We see images of winter giving way to spring, death giving way to new life. Our God comes to save, to bring happiness to full strength within us! Coming a few days before Christmas, as this reading does, we are encouraged to see in the birth of Jesus the coming of our God to

bring us new life and joy!

December 22nd 1 Sm 1:24-28

Today we take up the story of the great Samuel. As with Samson, he too is born after his parents pray to God for a Child. Again, a woman unable to have a child has given birth. Samuel will be a great leader who will eventually crown David as king. Since Jesus is from the line of David, we now await his birth as the savior whom God sends to deliver us!

December 23rd Mal 3:1-4, 23-24

Today we hear two prophesies about the Day of the Lord. Malachi says that the Lord himself will come and visit the temple. The temple, and therefore the country, will once again be filled with the presence of the Lord. He will not leave his people in their sin and sorrow. He also prophesies a sign of this coming: Elijiah will come from God to prepare us to receive the Lord. Obviously, the Church wishes us to understand the reference here to John the Baptist (Elijah), and Jesus. Once again, hope shines in our Advent Season!







Was Jesus born in a stable or a cave? The Christmas scene in our church has Jesus born in a little shed. but in my friend's church it looks more like a cave. The Bible says Jesus was born in a manger, so just where was Jesus born?

The Christmas scenes, sometimes called Nativity scenes or crèches, vary from church to church. In Scripture, we find more details about the Nativity in Luke's Gospel, but even he simply

says that Mary wrapped Jesus in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger because the inn was full (Luke 2:7).

In none of the Scriptures do we have any details about what the place looked like, but since a manger is a place where caregivers feed livestock, we can assume that Jesus was born in a stable of some kind. At that time, small caves sometimes were used as stables.

Nativity scenes, though, are not an attempt to present a historically accurate picture of where Jesus was born. Rather, scenes of the birth of Jesus remind us of the special love that God shows for us in sending the Son to us. We do not care so much about creating an exact picture of what took place as we do of beholding the beauty and wonder of God born among us. •
