

Our Lady of the Desert

April 14th 1 Jn 2:1-5a

John reminds us today that we should be striving to overcome the power of sin in our lives. Yet, if we do fall into sin, John reminds us that Jesus is our advocate with the Father. Through his intercession, and through his death and resurrection, forgiveness is always ours! We simply need to turn to him and persevere in trying to follow his teachings to the best of our ability.

April 15th Acts 6:8-15

Stephen, one of the seven chosen to wait on tables, is the center of today's reading. Stephen has been a dedicated servant of Jesus. He has spoken the teachings of the faith very faithfully. As a result, Stephen is arrested. Just like trumped up charges were filed against Jesus, so are lies used to convict Stephen. Yet, even in the face of this persecution and threat, Stephen's faith in Jesus is intact. Stephen is a witness that if we really have Faith in Jesus, we never have to fear. He will save us. Maybe not in this life, but definitely in the next life!

April 16th Acts 7:51—8:1a

Today we see the ending of the Stephen story. Stephen speaks the truth which upsets the authorities. In punishment, they begin to stone him to death. Stephen sees a vision of the heavens opened and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. Thus, Jesus is present to him even in his moment of suffering and death. Suffering and death will not be the final answer. God's love will prevail in eternal life.

April 17th Acts 8:1b-8

Saul (later to become Paul) saw the murder of Stephen in yesterday's reading. Saul was a faithful Jew, very zealous for his faith. He begins a fierce persecution of Christians in Jerusalem. To avoid his efforts, many Christians leave the area of Jerusalem and go throughout Israel. They spread the message of Jesus with them as they go. Phillip is one of these disciples. He was another of the seven men chosen to wait on tables. His preaching becomes very successful, because he also works great miracles. Through the life of Phillip, Jesus still works in the world. So too he wishes to work through us and through our acts of love.

April 18th Acts 8:26-40

The Spirit continues to guide Phillip. He is sent to the chariot of a man from Ethiopia. Phillip hears him reading a prophesy from Isaiah which was fulfilled in Jesus. After Phillip shares with him about Jesus, the Ethiopian gets baptized. Phillip goes off to preach in other places. The persecution in Jerusalem has now brought about the spread of the Church throughout the whole world. Persecution did not have the last say. God's will for the Salvation of all wins out!

April 19th Acts 9:1-20

Today, Paul is converted to Jesus. He has a vision of Jesus on the road. When the vision identifies himself as Jesus, Paul's world is turned upside down. How could someone who was dead be speaking to him? Through this experience, Paul comes to believe in the resurrection of Jesus and he will become perhaps the greatest preacher of the good news! Paul's ignorance and sin are overcome by the mercy of God and by his Baptism!




April 20th Acts 9:31-42



Contemplative Intensive Retreat with Fr. Stephen Rehrauer, CSsR

April 26-28, 2024

To truly follow Christ from the depths of our lives we must seek "within" through quiet prayerful meditation and listen to his Spirit speaking there. In clearing the ground of our lives through Christian contemplation, the seed of God's Kingdom sown there can flourish and produce a hundred-fold.



Dear Padre,

What is a "covenant," and how are marriage and covenant related?

"Covenant" is the word the Church employs to define and describe the sacrament of matrimony. It is clearly based on the idea of "covenant" contained in Scripture. In contrast, society uses the related word "contract," as in the "marriage contract." However, these two words do not mean the same thing.

The meaning of "contract" is too limited to contain the full commitment of Christian marriage. When you sign a contract, you are legally bound only to

its terms. You need not do more or less than what is stipulated in its wording. Warmth and concern for the wellbeing of one party for the other are not stipulated in a contract.

A covenant, on the other hand, is different. Although it may contain some aspects of contract, it establishes a personal relationship of closeness, affection, and warmth, and it locks the couple into a mutual commitment to each other's well-being.

As God freely chose Israel from all the nations possible, so do two people choose each other from all other people. As God declared, "I will take you as my people, and I will be your God" (Exodus 6:7). In the same way, a husband and wife pledge total commitment to each other.

Christian marriage bears the same characteristics of covenant commitment—the personal relationship of caring, loyalty, intimacy, exclusivity, permanency, and, above all, love; hence the use of "covenant" to define Christian marriage.
