

Our Lady of the Desert

Last week we started viewing the 5th Commandment. We saw that we were made in God's image, and how we must respect human life because it is sacred to God.


The catechism next turns to see ourselves as having this sacred gift of life. The catechism says, "Love towards oneself remains a fundamental principle of morality. Therefore, it is legitimate to insist on respect for one's own right to life" (CCC #2264). To defend oneself against violence is not necessarily sinful, even if the death of the other person is caused by my defense. However, the death of the other must never be our aim. As the catechism says, "The act of self-defense can have a double effect: the preservation of one's own life; and the killing of the aggressor... the one is intended, the other is not" (CCC # 2263). If we can defend ourselves without causing the death of our attacker, that is what we are called to do. Self-defense must always be about protecting myself, never about the killing of another.

The same idea speaks towards the duty of the state to protect its citizens. As the catechism says, "Preserving the common good of society requires rendering the aggressor unable to inflict harm" (CCC # 2266). The catechism continues, "If bloodless means are sufficient to defend human lives against an aggressor... public authority should limit itself to such means." (CCC #2267). Even murderers possess human life which must be held as sacred. While not directly ruling out capital punishment, the catechism says it must be used only when there is no other less lethal way of insuring the common good.



for the safety of both Mother and Child.


We praise God that as their faithful protector, you never hesitated to sacrifice for those entrusted to you.

Reclaiming Our Self-Worth

Self-worth is the value you place on yourself, which can be influenced by your experiences, societal expectations, and how you perceive your abilities and qualities. It reflects your self-esteem and can affect your overall mental health and well-being.

Positive Psychology

Countless people struggle with having good self-worth. Generally, self-worth is something we are inherently born with. But some of us were deprived of developing a positive sense of self-worth because we grew up in dysfunctional household where one or both of our caregivers were suffering from poor self-worth.

As a result, they passed on their negative feelings about themselves, teaching us to see ourselves in a similar way to how they saw themselves.

Low self-worth in adulthood keeps us from feeling worthy of love, can interfere with our studies or job performance and has a tremendous negative impact on our personal relationships. We can't expect others are going to love us if we aren't willing to accept and love ourselves.

Lost Without Love

Living with Fear of Abandonment

"Ultimately, childhood emotional neglect teaches you not only to abandon your emotions but also to abandon yourself."

Psychology Today

Human relationships are difficult and messy for many reasons. One of those reasons is fear of abandonment. Many people grow up in families where one or both parents are emotionally unavailable.


Emotionally unavailable parents are unable to model emotional intelligence and meet the emotional needs of their children. As a result, the emotional development of those children is stunted.

Worse yet is the fact that when a parent isn't able to respond affectionately to the joys and sorrows of their children, those children begin to believe that their feelings and needs don't count.

When children are continually met with emotional coldness, they develop the belief that they are somehow unacceptable to their parents, feel like they have to earn love to be loved and develop a fear of abandonment if they aren't able to succeed at winning their parents approval.

Feeling unloveable, the child then abandons him or herself. As they grow older, the fear of being rejected haunts them and can destroy their relationships. No matter how much love and acceptance another person may offer them, the emotionally abandoned person is unable to believe it or accept it for fear of being left behind again.

Awareness is the key. This retreat will provide awareness into this problem and offer solutions to counter fear of abandonment.

Dear Padre,

My wife mentioned that neither the Book of Mormon nor the Catholic Bible mentions purgatory. Please comment.

A not-uncommon frustration is when a person searches the Bible for a particular word or phrasing. Frankly, it is expecting too much from the religious text to be able to faithfully record a particular word or phrase that originated hundreds of years after the ancient text was composed. Purgatory is one such example of this frustration. The concept of purgatory is referenced in the biblical text, particularly in 2 Corinthians 5:10 and 7:1, Hebrews 9:27 and 12:14, and 2 Maccabees 12:46, but the word is never used.



This should come as no real surprise because it was not until the writings of St. Thomas Aquinas (1225–1274) that the concept was expanded and formed into a theological statement of belief that has become central to Roman Catholicism. And what is that belief? The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* is clear: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (*CCC*, 1030, 1031a). The Book of Mormon never references purgatory, but it does speak about the afterlife and the experience of "waiting" in the spirit world for the completion of earthly time. •
