

The catechism next speaks about Prostitution. The catechism states, "Prostitution does injury to the dignity of the person who engages in it, reducing the person to an instrument of sexual pleasure." (CCC # 2355) Once again, prostitution violates the 6th commandment because it does not involve the mutual sharing of oneself with a spouse. It is only within such a union of love that sex is permitted according to the teachings of the Church. The one who engages in prostitution therefore "violates the Chasity to which his Baptism pledged him and defiles his body, the temple of the Holy Spirit." (CCC #2355)

Next, the Catechism looks to Rape. Rape does injury to justice and charity. It "deeply ruins the respect, freedom, and physical and moral integrity to which every person has a right." (CCC # 2356) Rape is always a very grave sin. The Catechism also includes incest and child abuse in this category. Again, we see that rape offends against the free sharing of partners in a committed relationship, and it additionally causes physical and psychological harm to the victim. It is a twofold failure against chastity and the human person..

Right to Life Month





There is perhaps no more beautiful celebration than when parents bring their newborn child to the waters of baptism. Parents, godparents, family, and friends share in this sacrament with incomparable joy. For in baptism, we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and through the outward signs of water and oil, are made children of God and given the hope of eternal life with Him.

"The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope." Through our Lord Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious. "Hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may bring." Because of this Christian hope, we can face the unknown trials of life with faith rather than fear.

For "hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross."

Having been "buried with Christ in Baptism, we receive in his resurrection the gift of a new life that breaks down the walls of death." Confident of God's presence within us, may we share the Gospel of Life with those most in need of hope, knowing that "the grace of God precedes and accompanies his people as they press forward firm in faith, active in charity and steadfast in hope."



Dear Padre,

What is the Church's view on having crystal stones or sage in the home to bring in positive energy?

The Church does not have an official position on every possible human action or activity. The Church believes in the discerning principle of maturity and fully expects that the people of God will use the ability that has been entrusted to them by the Creator in a positive manner. The Church understands the power of mystery and the power of symbols



but rightfully assigns any "energy" that mystery and symbols may generate to the power of the Holy Spirit. Inanimate objects, by the very definition of "inanimate," do not generate energy. They may be symbols of energy, but they do not have energy in and of themselves.

If you enjoy crystals because of their beauty or because of the way they diffuse light, then there is no harm in having them in your house. If you like the smell of sage, then use it and enjoy it. All symbols have different meanings, depending on how they are understood and used by the people who gathered, collect, and store them for use. These symbols have no power in and of themselves for good or for evil. However, if you live in a culture that has identified the meaning of a symbol, and that assigned meaning contradicts Christian belief and practice, it would be best to avoid that symbol. •
